<sup>1</sup> Please note that ANTY 101D, ANTY 215IS, ANTY 225IS, and either SOCI 101IS, SOCI 110IS, SOCI 150D or SOCI 201D are required for completion of the major and do not fulfill university D, or IS, Core requirements for Anthropology Majors.

<sup>2</sup> 21 of the required 24 Anthropology elective credits must be upper division (300 -400 level) and no more than 6 credits of ANTY 490R or ANTY 492 combined can count toward fulfillment of elective credits

Departmental Honors: Students may graduate with Departmental Honors if they meet the following requirements: GPA of 3.5 or higher and complete an undergraduate thesis in Anthropology.

For Anthropology majors, the maximum number of Anthropology transfer credits accepted is 18.

For graduation in Anthropology students must have a grade of C- or higher in all Anthropology courses. A minimum of 120 credits is required for graduation; 42 of these credits must be in courses numbered 300 and above.
